North Island	Fruit is now rolling into the North Island packhouses for all five crop types and the dry weather in the lass week has helped ease the fruit cracking potential. That said, the results of the previous wet spell are still evident in the crack prone varieties. GDD are back to last years' levels, out near the sea at Bay View, and still ahead in the more inland areas. There is some rain predicted but with luck it will leave the orchard areas alone. The season had been coming back towards a more normal harvest time, but the next 3-4 days of near 30°C with warm nights and high humidity, will bring on the near to ready varieties. PET of up to 6mm/day is predicted. Pockets of wind have dropped near ripe fruit to the ground.			
	For growers, the good quality growing conditions are being tempered by the ir	nexperienced	labour supply.	
	Marlborough is looking forward to a good end to its cherry season with mild temperatures, reasonable PET in the 4mm/day region and a dry week. Let's hope so as the cherry pipeline is not yet full.			
South Island	The Central Otago cherry harvest of mainstream varieties is now getting underway with good volume expected to enter the market later this week. Temperatures in the low 20s and high teens with only a brief period of rain later in the week speak to good-eating fruit.			
<ul> <li>Cherries LOW MED HIGH</li> <li>Cherry volumes have not been large enough so far this year due to rain induced splitting in both Hawke's Bay and Marlborough. These districts are finishing Sonnet and Dawson, picking Stella, and looking to start Lapins and Rainier. Those that have had rain covers have picked and sold more fruit, and heavy crops have survived better than light loads. The trend to more and larger sizes in punnets is continuing.</li> <li>Chelan from Cromwell is now being picked and should fill the pipeline by the end of the week. Rosann then Sonnet and Santina are not too far away. The new Picnic cherry seems to be making quite a splash from the very early production in Earnscleugh.</li> </ul>				
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 $\succ$ Red Beaut and Rose Zee are the main stays of plums with good size and good crop loads. An early sport of Black Diamond is being sold in small volumes. We are looking forward to Purple Majesty closer to Christmas.
