

market update

Overview	The supply of cherry is short, apricot is nicely balanced, peach and nectarine supply are mostly good. This situation is expected to change as the Central Otago supply continues and main crop peach/nectarine from Hawkes Bay enter the NZ market. Growers are saying that the price at retail needs to reflect the supply situation so that fruit keeps moving through the system – especially with the levels of rot that are potentially in fruit from the wet December. That said, larger orders are being placed for the quality peaches and nectarines that are coming on stream. Let's see if the system will get the balance of supply-demand-price right! Please have another look at the cool chain system from harvest through to sales. From the bits and pieces that I have seen, as well as the odd report received, it's not always up to standard. With fruit that has grown in wet conditions the storage and transit temperatures are even more critical.		
North Island	Fine and warm conditions have been experienced in Hawkes Bay and this is set to continue for this week. The apricot harvest is ending, peach and nectarine continues, while main crop plum varieties are getting into full swing. Quality issues are being reported for over-ripe and 'mouldy' peaches. The mid-season 'quality' varieties are now getting lots of sun and heat which will make for good eating.		
South Island	The rain of a few of days ago in Central Otago will have some impact on cherry harvesting, especially		
cherries	LOW	MED	HIGH
 After last season, strong marketing programmes were put in place with the major supermarkets, but the supply is not meeting that requirement. Visiting two of my local supermarkets this morning there was not a cherry to be seen. Central Otago is picking Kordia, Lapins, Stardust and Silvia at present, with Sweetheart to come soon. We are expecting Staccato which is a bit further away to be fine. 			
apricots	LOW	MED	HIGH
 There is just a little bit of Clutha Gold and Trevatt to leave Hawkes Bay. It should be all over and done with by this time next week and then we can concentrate solely on the South Island product. Lots of Central Otago Sundrop is available, as well as some Dunstan. A few hot days have brought the harvest on earlier than originally thought and therefore there is now an overlap with Hawkes Bay fruit. Clutha Gold, Clutha Sun and Clutha Gem will be among the next varieties available. 			
nectarines	LOW	MED	HIGH
 Full range of Classic (Red Bright), Pearl (Kay Pearl) and Honey branded nectarines are available. The much-anticipated Mid Star is now under way and Hunny Royale has started. Spring Bright and Fire Brite have gone well and with Chrystal & Maylis will be finishing soon. There is a little bit of Big Orange around and a little bit of Big Bang is being sold locally in Central Otago. Anticipating Fire Pearl, Bright Pearl, Red Gold and some Sun Glo next week. 			
peaches	LOW	MED	HIGH
 In Central the early, very small volumes of Spring Lady and Crown Princess can be found. Major marketers are not sourcing any peaches from Central yet. Sweet Dream and Tropical Candy is mid to late harvest. Other peaches available include Rom Star, Velvet Sister, Blazing Star, and Summer Blaze, with the last of the Improved Flavourcrest and Conquise. Anticipating Coconut Ice and Flamecrest sometime next week. Rich Lady will be coming to the end of supply. We are anticipating Elegant Lady, Scarlet O'Hara and the white fleshed Vanillia. 			
plums	LOW	MED	HIGH
 A little bit of Rose Zee is being harvested from Central and remaining for local supply. Early areas of HB are nearing the end of Fortune with the main crops just beginning from the rest of the district. Volume will build through the next two weeks. Black Amber is finishing very soon Primetime from HB is thinking about starting with a few skim picks happening. Black Diamond is also becoming available.
