

market update

North Island	According to NIWA a La Ninã summer will be bring moist rainy conditions to the east coast of the North Island, less rain to the SW of the South Island and warmer temperatures everywhere. This seems to be exactly what's happening. Last week was warmer and wetter than average and this week we are anticipating warm days, warm nights and dribbles of rain all week. Growing degree days, GDD, are as good as it's been in the last few years, possibly because of the warm nights. We are anticipating potential evapotranspiration to be 2-5 mm/day for the next seven days.
	Marlborough has been wet again, has accumulated good GDD, and is anticipating warm days and moderate night temperatures, much like Hawkes Bay.
South Island	Central Otago generally has very good GDD accumulation, and has been slightly warmer and wetter than the long-term average. We are expecting mild days and cool nights in the coming week with some rain on most days. PET will be in the 2-5mm/day range.

- Burlat is finishing from Central Otago and the Sonnet/Santina/Samba triumvirate is still a few days away. Picnic and Lani are available. Chelan might be available next week. The supply chain is still not full, due to weather and non-optimal sets. These lighter crops might see harvest come forward a little.
- I have 3 separate containers of cherries on my shelf. None of them brilliant but knowing that it's a difficult season on early fruit I can understand what is going on. The better two are a bit bland and a bit soft. The third is bad. Bought locally it's pink, acidic and has a brix of 11.5 where grade standards would suggest a minimum of 16! We know from consumer buyer behaviour research done in the past that NZ consumers with a similar experience will not buy any more cherries for 6 weeks.

- Rotting fruit has been seen on the shelves. While this is not unexpected after the rain that has fallen, it's still disappointing to see and a warning for the rest of the season.
